


You might want to ask someone to help you read it.

Pressure damage is also known as bedsores, pressure sores and pressure ulcers.






It is when your skin gets red, sore or breaks down into a wound.



Pressure damage can happen anywhere on the body.

But some areas of the body are more at risk:






## staying active in hospital

They can also be caused if something rubs against your skin too much.


Like bad fitting shoes, your glasses or some medical equipment like oxygen masks.

Everyone is at risk of pressure damage in hospital because you move less.

But you can help to prevent them.

 They can't move themselves.





### People are more at risk if:

 They already have a pressure ulcer.


 They have a change in how their skin feels.


 Or how they can move.



#### People are more at risk if:


 They are overweight or underweight.

 Their mood is very low causing them to move less.




